
INTERPRETING the ANCIENT & MODERN SUN-WATCHING LOGO

Ancestral Puebloan people living in Chaco Canyon created this rock carving (called a petroglyph). This may be their impression of the 1097 total solar eclipse, possibly with a solar storm in the corona. Chaco is a World Heritage site in New Mexico with lots of evidence for ancient Sun-watching.



Modern scientists created this image of the 2013 total solar eclipse. When the Moon totally blocks light from the Sun's disk, we can see the streamers of the solar corona. The eclipses of 1097, 2013 (and 2024!) are all among those that have occured during a period when solar storms are more likely.



The PUNCH Outreach logo combines these two images to represent our Ancient & Modern Sun-Watching theme.
